New for 2016-2017 STAR Area Competitions

Skate Canada has introduced new events and changes for the 2016-2017 Season.

The first is a reworking of the Solo Ice Dance Events. Solo dance events have been created for every level—see the chart below for a brief overview and the Skate Canada Info Centre for more complete information. It should be noted that these events are open to **BOTH** STAR and Competitive skaters. The one stipulation being that if a competitive skater does enter a solo dance event, then he/she must skate UP one level for the same calendar year. For example, a Juvenile dancer skating at Summer Skate would have to enter the Pre-Novice (STAR 8-9) Solo Dance event at an area competition. It should also be noted that Key Points will not be used for Pattern Dances in any of the Solo Dance events from STAR 2-3 up to and including the Novice (STAR 10-Gold) level.

The second change is in Free Skate with the reclassification of the Senior Bronze, Junior Silver and Senior Silver Free Skate to STAR 6, 8 and 10 with the Gold event staying the same. Two new levels have also been introduced—STAR 7 and 9. STAR 7 and 9, are ‘short programs’, similar to a competitive short program, elements are specified and must be executed by the skater. These events will provide a good introduction to short programs for those skaters that might be interested in continuing on to the competitive stream. The reclassification and addition of events has also meant changes to qualifications of the judges sitting on the judges panel—CPC judges will now be required for STAR 5 and up. Sections will be deciding on the judging panel qualifications per event as the season progresses.

Novice (STAR 10-Gold)	Must have passed at least two pattern dances from the Gold Dance Test or higher	Two	Blues and Quickstep
Open Solo Short Dance	Must have passed the complete Senior Silver Dance Test and are under the age of 21		Blues rhythm specified with an optional second rhythm of Swing or Hip Hop. Required elements include; two sequences of the Blues pattern dance; one midline, diagonal, or circular step sequence; one set of sequential twizzles; one dance spin.

CPC Components—A Quick Reference Chart:

Component	Also Known As...	Elements
Skating Skills	Balance	Overall coordination/Balance; Edge control/flow; Multi-directional skating; Strength; Effortless power and acceleration
Transitions	Connections	‘Threading’ of elements; Intricacy/quality; Variety; Meaningful and appropriateness; patterns
Performance/Execution	Delivery	Ability of deliver and projection; Carriage and style; Clarity and variety; Unison
Choreography/Composition	Design	Purpose/idea; Structure/pattern; Design/dimension; Movement—Musical phasing
Interpretation	Feeling	Interesting and appropriate translation of music to movement; Use of musical highlights and nuances; Music’s style and character; Continu-

Skate Canada Allowance for Possible Head Injuries:

“At any time in Skate Canada competitions (qualifying and non-qualifying) if the Referee feels there is a possible head injury or concern of concussion or if advised by medical, they should blow the whistle or stop the music to signal to the Skater(s) to stop skating. The Referee will allow a break of up to three minutes for the Skater(s) to be assessed. In all domestic competitions, if the skater is able to continue no deduction will be applied.”
